TREES FOR


As part of our 'Forgotten Places: Greening Coastal Towns and Cities' project, we planted an unbelievable 40,945 trees in Hull. The City Council partnered with Rewilding Youth to make it happen, bringing key green jobs and skills to the city. This was led by 3 project staff and a further 10 employees, who were found through the DWP Kickstart programme, including Ground Conservationists who ran outdoor activities to engage the local community with urban trees and nature. These activities, including bushcraft, helped locals, especially those aged between 16 and 24, to gain the skills and knowledge to supplement their new careers in the environmental sector.

TREES FOR

BEXHILL

Our community engagement team built strong relationships with the residents of Bexhill across numerous planting days and tree training opportunities, which led to 3983 urban trees being planted in the area. These community activities saw residents learning how to plant and care for trees alongside our tree experts. This led to a groundswell of grassroots enthusiasm, culminating in the first ever Bexhill Tree Festival in October 2022. Organised in partnership with Rother District Council and East Sussex County Council, the event celebrated urban trees, and showcased local art, storytelling, workshops, music, and crafting activities for all.
